ALTERED/MOVED NOTES: Original site. All evidence of horse stalls and milk cow stanchions has been removed. Roof has been covered with steel roofing. Walls have been covered with horizontal steel roofing. Lean-to/s appear to have been built with original barn. Cupola is gone.

The temperature was in the 90's and the humidity was very high today. Owner would not allow me to look inside of the barn. He did not want the hogs disturbed, to start running and over heat. (Hogs do not sweat and can over heat very quickly on hot days.) The interior information listed, was given verbally by owner.

INTERIOR NOTES: Two rows of 6x6 posts, and (3) 2x8 for beams support the 2x8 joists for the hayloft floor.

OTHER NOTES: 2x4 stud walls, 1x6 #106 drop siding and horizontal steel roofing. Rafters are 2x6's in main barn and lean-to's. Owner did not remember any bracing in hayloft. Windows are 4"x24" four light. Original cupola was wooden, which dates the barn before 1900.





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SKETCH MAP




FIRST FLOOR



HISTORY

This farm located in the NE ¼ of Section 27, Star Township, Clay County was homesteaded by David W. Judson.

The 1894 and 1902 Clay County Atlas lists A. (Alvin) L. Haver as the owner.

The 1012 Clay County Atlas lists Elma & Harry Haver as the owners.

The 1924, 1937, 1948 and 1956 Clay County Atlas lists Harry L. Haver as the owner.

Oral History by John Haver (Grandson of Alvin Haver)

Alvin L. Haver moved to this farm in 1883. He became the owner in 1885. He died in 1887 in a prairie fire.

Alvin Haver Family

Alvin Haver was born in Canada in 1853. His father, John Haver, was born in New York in 1810. His mother was born in Canada.

It is not known when Alvin came to South Dakota but he did homestead here. The 1880 census shows that at that time he was married to Elizabeth Patrick and they had an 11 month old son, John W.

The 1880 census also show that his father, John Haver, was in Clay County living with his daughter, Mariah and son-in-law Rupert Gayford. The Gayfords had a three-year old son, Frank, who was born in Iowa. Rupert was born in Michigan. He was a carpenter by trade.

Elizabeth Haver Family

Elizabeth (Patrick) Haver was born in Long Ferry, Ireland, June I, 1849, the third child of John Patrick and Isabella (Porter) Haver. Her brothers and sisters were; Robert, Isabella, William, Samuel, Minnie and Margaret Ann. She came to America with her parents when she was 16 years of age. The family resided for a while in Wisconsin, coming to Clay County in 1871. Her father homesteaded five miles northwest of Wakonda. Elizabeth took a homestead of her own, the north quarter where Milo Peterson now lives.

In 1878 she married Alvin L. Haver who was homesteading northeast of Wakonda. They lived six years at Riverside, east of Wakonda. Three sons were born there; John William, Harry Lester and an infant son died and is buried in the Barton Cemetery five miles south and ¼ west of Centerville.

In 1883 they bought the farm from Mr. Judson who had homesteaded it. Mr. Haver died November 30, 1888. (Note date in oral history) Mrs. Haver continued to live on the farm with the help of her two young sons, carried on most of the farming operation. She was small, but had a talent for business management.

Mrs. Haver was a charter member of the Congregational Church and for more than 50 years, was a sincere worker and supporter of the church. She was a member of the Rebekah Lodge.

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In 1908 she sold her farm to her son Harry and moved into Wakonda, where she made her home until her death Feb. 18, 1936. She had been in normal health until she suffered a stroke and died 24 hours later without regaining consciousness. She is buried beside her husband in Union Cemetery, Wakonda.
