





HISTORY

This farm located in the SW 1/4 & SE ½ of Section 29, Fairview Township, Clay county was homesteaded by John Boyle. Most of the farm was the Missouri River at that time. Only part of Section 29 was dry land, which was the part of the NW ¼, all of NE ¼ and part of the SE ¼. The flood in the spring of 1881 moved the river about a mile South.

The 1894 and 1901 Clay County Atlas lists Carl Gunderson as the owner. The southern part of the Section 29 was list as a willow bar in the old river bed.

The 1912 Clay County Atlas lists Henry Stevens as the owner. The southern part of the Section 29 was list as sand bar.

The 1924, 1937, 1948 and 1956 Clay County Atlas lists J. L. Stevens as the owner. Today the south part of the Section 29 is very good sandy loam farm land.

J. Lee Stevenson bought this farm and built the barn. According to the 1924 Clay County Atlas he owned the farm at that time. He would have bought it from the Henry Stevens or inherited the farm. 1912 Clay County Atlas lists Henry Stevens as the owner. Oral history is that the Stevenson family built the barn first. They lived in the barn for one year while the house was built.

Axel Miller Jensen was born October 19, 1905 in Rholte, Demark. When He was 20 years old, his father bought a farm at Bjersted and he helped his father farm this for one year. Then he went to work for a grocer at Jyderup. Axel was always saving his money with a dream of going to Greenland. The grocer suggested he dream bigger and go to America and that he would barrow him the money to do so, which he did. So in 1926 Axel sailed for America on the Hellgoalf and landed on Ellis Island where they were treated like cattle. From there he went to Anton Nielson, South Bend, Indiana and worked for the John Nelson Construction Co. until the fall and again in the spring. In the winter months he worked for the Studebaker Car Manufacturing Co.

In 1928 Axel answered an ad for a farm hand in the paper and came to Meckling, South Dakota to work for Eiler Jensen. He met and married Clara Nelson and they started their married life near Blunt, South Dakota. They built a one-room shack that wasn't finished on the inside. It got so cold that Axel froze his ears in bed. They lived in this "castle on the prairie" for about 8 months where they farmed 400 acres of wheat, barley and flax. In 1931 they rented a farm from the state that had a nice house, barn and a chicken house. World credit became so bad that the farm was turned back to the state and in the fall of 1932 the Jensen's moved to a rented farm by Mission Hill. They lived several different places before purchasing 40 acres in 1939, 3 miles west and 1 mile south of Meckling. Over the years they purchased more land, added buildings and fed cattle and hogs. They sold the farm to Fritz Bartels in 1956 and moved to Vermillion where Axel ran the Texaco Gas Station on Forest and Main.



In 1956 Axel bought the J. Lee Stevensen farm on the Burbank Road, 160 acres for \$300.00 an acre. In 1957 they moved to the farm. Clara died of cancer in November of 1958. In November of 1959, Axel married Vera Miller of Onowa, Iowa. In 1978 Axel had a sale and quit farming. They bought a new house, built a Springfield University and moved it on the farm and rented the land to Calvin Hawley. The farm, except for the few acres where the house sits, was sold to Calvin Hawley in 1986.

Axel Jensen passed away in January of 1997 at the age of 91 in Vermillion.
