ALTERED/MOVED NOTES: Original site. Parts of horse stalls in the main barn have been

removed. Original barn was a 26' x 36' gable roof barn with a 10' lean-to on the North wall. Barn was remodeled into a 36' x 36' gambrel roof barn. Longer studs were nailed along sides of existing studs to

make a 14' 6" wall and to frame the gable ends. Diagonal sheathing was applied the opposite direction to finish sheathing the walls. A gambrel roof was framed to make a large hayloft. The $\frac{1}{2}$ "x6" cedar siding was not disturbed and new siding was spliced in showing the exact shape of the original barn.

INTERIOR NOTES: <u>Two rows of 4x6 posts, 4x6 beams and the 2x4 original wall support 2x8 floor joists</u> for hayloft floor. Enough evidence to show where 7 horse stalls were in the main barn. 10' x 8' granary and a 6' x 8' tack room still on the East wall.

OTHER NOTES: 2X6 stud walls with 1x10 diagonal sheathing on three exterior walls and 1x10

horizontal sheathing on the North wall. ¹/₂"x 6" cedar lap siding on all four exterior walls. Windows are 8" X 10" four light installed on their side. Rafters are 2x6's with two rows of three 2x6 laminated posts

supporting the 2x6 beam at the hip.	1x6 bracing at the hip on two rafters $8' - 8'$	$-6'-8'-6'O_{1}C_{2}$

Barn is in fair condition.



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
SKETCH MAP





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HISTORY

This farm located in the NE ¹/₄ of Section 27, Riverside Township, Clay County was homesteaded by Carl Johan Anderson. He listed his name on his homestead claim as Charles Anderson to make his name more Americanized. He homesteaded land in Sections 22 and 27.

The 1894 Clay County Atlas lists Charles Anderson as the owner.

The 1901 and 1912 Clay County Atlas lists C. J. Anderson (Carl Johan) as the owner. He was going back to his original name, but only using the intials.

The 1924, 1937, 1948 and 1956 Clay County Atlas lists M. K. Alexander as the owner.

The Following is from History of the Swedes Who settled in Clay County, South Dakota By August Peterson

Carl Johan Anderson Family

Carl Johan Anderson, changed his name to Charles Anderson, was born Jan. 11 1843, in Mjolby, Ostergotland, Sweden. He was one of the earliest homesteaders in Riverside Township. He came to the United States in 1868 and to Clay County in the spring of 1868. His wife was Sofia (Shoberg) born March 20, 1843, in Husby Parish, Darlarna, Sweden. She arrived to Clay County one year later. Her father was John E. Shoberg, who was also a homesteader on adjoining land in Section 27.

C. J. and Sofia Anderson had in all 12 children. (1) Hilda Anderson the oldest born Apr. 17, 1868, in Stockholm, Sweden and came to the United States with her mother when she was one year old. She married Henry C. Getcher in 1885. (2 & 3) Two of the Anderson children died of diphtheria in the early years. (4) Hulda C. Anderson, the fourth child, was born in 1872. She married Emil Kron. (5) Herman Anderson was born Jan. 7, 1875 and died in his youth, 18 years old, July 25, 1893. (6) Willie J. Anderson, born Aug. 18, 1876. (7 & 8) The next two children died in the diphtheria epidemic that raged in the 1880's through the settlement. (9) David L. Anderson, born 1883. (10) Marie Anderson, born



Apr. 19, 1885, was married in 1905 to John N. Johnson. (11) Eddy I. Anderson, born Dec. 20, 1888 and married Myrtle Wilson. (12) Robert Anderson, born ?, married Vivian Holcomb.

The mother of, Mrs. C. J. Anderson, Sofia (Shoberg) Anderson was the first victim of the prairie fires in the settlement. She burned to death on her claim in the attempt to unloosen a calf in the straw barn, which was a common building in those days. Her maiden name was Greta Stina (Jacobsdotter). She died in the fall of 1870 and lies buried on the bluff overlooking the Vermillion River in Section 12, Riverside Township.
