





# HISTORY

This farm located in the SE ¼ of Section 6, Star Township, Clay County was homesteaded by Frederick Ralyer.

The 1894 and 1901 Clay County Atlas lists George H. Brown as the owner.

The 1912, 1924, 1937 and 1948 Clay County Atlas lists C. N. Peterson as the owner.

The 1956 Clay County Atlas lists Roth Lynn as the owner.

## A Centennial History of Irene, S. D The Village in the Valley 1893 - 1993

#### C. N. (Chris) Peterson

Chris N. Peterson, son of Peter and Anna Peterson, was born in Sindal, Denmark, July 15, 1869. He came to America at the age of 16 – arriving at Greeley, Colorado and worked there for a short time. He came to the Wakonda area in 1886 and worked as a farm hand until he was able to start farming for himself. He homesteaded on a farm in Bethel Township, Section 20, in 1887: which he later sold to the Wright family. He returned to Greeley to marry Johanna Blak and both returned to South Dakota where C. N. purchased a farm three miles south of Wakonda.

Their first two children – Herman and Herbert (Bert) were born on this farm – Herman in 1894 and Herbert in 1896. In 1898 he sold this farm and bought the Russell farm southeast of Irene, Now occupied by the Dan Huth family While residing here, a daughter Anna was born. In 1902, C. N. purchased another farm which became the family home and the birthplace of two more sons – Ralph and Wesley and a daughter Esther. This farm is presently owned by the youngest daughter Ruth and is now



occupied by Randy Anderson. Randy's father, Arnold, started working for Chris in the year of 1932 and remained on that farm until his retirement in 1987. Johanna Peterson died in the year of 1911.

On June 2, 1914 Chris married Anna Nelson. Anna had three children by a previous marriage. Chris and Anna were blessed with a daughter Ruth. C. N. became one of the largest cattle feeders in the area and was known for his cattle buying throughout the state. He not only purchased western cattle - many local farmers sold him their cattle. Most all of his grain was purchased directly from local farmers. C, N, was a great booster for the community and was always active in community improvements such as road building, etc. He was a member and local supporter of the Irene Methodist Church. He served on the Irene Board of Education for approximately 23 years. He had the reputation of always giving the other fellow a little of the best of any deal in which he was involved and in spite of his age, during the last few years when the going was tough at times, he took financial reverses with a smile and went right to work to make it up.

Chris died on June 16, 1939: being 69 years of age at the time of his death.

A brief summary of his children, are as follows;

Herman married Leona Means. He served in the United States Army in World War 1 Later, he was a self-employed businessman, and resided in Irene.

"Bert" enlisted in the Marine Corp in World War 1, returned and married Inga Anderson. They farmed and fed cattle. He served as Clay County Commissioner for 27 years.

Anna married Olin Lokken. Olin managed Montgomery Ward Stores and later was associated with Augustana College.

Ralph married Mary Ann Hilton. He was a graduate of the University of South Dakota School of Business. Career in management of Montgomery Ward Stores.



Wesley married Margaret Neal. He was a graduate of the University of South Dakota in chemistry and went on to receive his Doctorate Degree from Harvard University. He did research work with Dupont, Honeywell and 3M.

Ester married Herman Fennig. She was a graduate of the School of Nursing, McKennan Hospital, Sioux Falls.

Ruth (the only survivor) is presently living in Sioux Falls. She graduated from Irene High School and from the University of South Dakota in 1943. She received X-ray training at Sioux Valley Hospital and worked as a registered X-ray technician for seven years. Ruth married Patrick Lynn in 1948. He served as the pharmacist and manager of Lewis Drug Stores. One son was born in 1951. They lived in Huron, South Dakota for 14 years and then moved back to Sioux Falls where they reside now. Both Ruth and Pat are enjoying their retirement.
