







#### **HISTORY**

This site was located in the SE ¼ of Section 4, in Pleasant Valley Twp and was homesteaded by Geo. Wright

The 1894 Clay County Atlas list the M. E. Church as the owner. This was the site of the Methodist church. See the attached plat of the Village of Lodi on page 6.

The 1901 and 1912 Clay County Atlas lists Geo. Wright and or the village of Lodi.

The 1924 and 1937 Clay County Atlas lists Fred White as the owner.

The 1948 Clay County Atlas lists Mable White as the owner.

The 1956 Clay County Atlas lists Vincent White as the owner.

Village of Lodi was the second village in Clay County. Surveyed and platted in December 1873 by J. L. Fischer, Phillip Chandler surveyor.

Lodi was the site of the first water powered grist mill in Clay County. Built and operated by Herman Frier on the Vermillion River. Part of the dam can still be seen on the Vermillion River. The mill was owned by the Rudd brothers. It even had its own brand of flour "Belle of Lodi flour".

The village of Lodi flourished in the 1870's through the 1880's. The village was planning on the railroad fallowing the Vermillion River Valley. The village of Lodi had a general store, drug store, two harness shops, a hotel, two blacksmith shops, a carpenter shop, millinery shop, a post office, saloon, a doctor (Dr. W. C. Knight), a school, horse racing track and three churches (Baptist, Methodist and United Brethren. It was a thriving village.

When the railroad finally came in the 1890's, it was located about eight miles northwest of the village of Lodi. This was a death blow to the village. A new village of Wakonda was established next to the North Western railroad and most of the business firms moved to the new town. The village of Lodi struggled a few more years until it lost its post office in the early 1900's. The original post office is part of a home in the vacated town.
