ALTERED/MOVED NOTES: Original site. Any evidence of horse stalls has been removed.

Remodeled into a granary. West 10' x 16' granaries go up into the hayloft for 13' tall granaries. The NE 10'x18' granaries go up into hayloft for 10' tall granaries. Concrete floors and foundation were poured at the time of remodel. Hayloft floor removed in granary areas. Some floor joists left for support. Exterior walls in granary areas have extra studs added for 12" O.C. stud walls. Original foundation was native stone mortared with sand and lime. North lean-to was added later.

INTERIOR NOTES: <u>Has two rows of 6x6 posts, with (2) 2x6's for a beam. 6x6 posts in hayloft with 4x6</u> 8' back to the wall and a 4x4 posts and one 2x6 beam, 7' from exterior wall up to support rafters. The posts and beams are mortised and tendon with round pegs. Floor joists are 2x6's.


OTHER NOTES: 2x6 stud walls with 1x6 #106 drop siding and 1/2"x6" cedar lap siding, which was


added later. 2x6 studs, floor joists and 6x6's are rough sawn cottonwood. No evidence of any windows, Except in the South gable end, which was either a louvered opening or a very narrow window.


FIRST FLOOR AFTER REMODEL


First floor, looking NE, 6x6 post,(2) 2x6's beam, 2x6 floor joists and CAMERA DIRECTION: granary wall





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# History

Robert S. Howey homesteaded this land in 1869. He received his land patent February 14, 1874. It was listed as a "tree claim". Mr. Howey agreed to plant 10% of the land with trees to qualify the land as a tree claim. He named this farm "Walnut Grove". Most of the buildings were built in the 1870's. The first house was a dug out with walls of native stone mortared with sand and lime. In the 1870's a home was built on top of the dugout. The dugout became the partial basement of the house. The house is still standing today. Mr. and Mrs. Howey and six children lived in this dugout, which measured about 12' wide and 14' long!

The 1912 Clay County atlas listed Hilda Howey (wife of Robert S. Howey) as the owner.

Benjamin Harry Macy bought this farm and moved here March 1, 1915.

The 1924, 1937 and 1956 Clay County atlas listed B. Harry Macy as the owner. This farm has been in the Macy family for 97 years.

Anna (Hart) Howey died Mar. 8, 1881, at Vermillion, South Dakota and is buried at Vermillion. She was 43 years old. This left her husband of 25 years of marriage and 10 living children.

On October 1, 1881 Robert S Howey married Hilda Goodburn of Postville, Iowa.

### OBITUARY OF ROBERT S HOWEY (Bonn June 4, 1832 - Died August 18, 1905)

In the closing of the eyes of Robert S. Howey in the long sleep of death, there was removed from the scene of the world, one of the pioneens of ClayCounty - and a man loved and esteemed by all. For some time Mr. Howey had been a sufferen from Bright's disease and that malady was the cause of his death, which occured at his home in Spirit Mound Township on Friday of last week. It was with genuine sonrow that the news of his passing was neceived by his friends and the old time pioneens who came to this State in his company.

Robert Singer Howey was born near Rouse's Point, Canada on June 4, 1832. He was one of a family of ten children of Isaac Howey and Nancy Singer; the father of English and the mother of German descent. Here on the farm he grew up to manhood. In 1856 he was united in marriage to Anna S. Hant at Simcoe, where they both lived at that time. The same year he and his wife and her people migrated to the State of Wisconsin and settled near Portage. They remained here for four years, returning to the old home farm in Canada in 1860, where they lived till the Western Fever again so filled their mind that he and his wife and four daughters came over into the States during the Civil War in September of 1863 settling in Michigan. Here they lived till the spring of 1865 when he came west to the then Dakota Territory, and filed on the homestead in Spirit Mound Township which has even since been his home, and on July 4 of that year his wife and six children annived to take up the pioneer life with him. In 1881 his wife was removed by death, (leaving her husband and 10 children), for that better land on March 8. One son of this manniage died in infancy.

As an old pioneen, and after a solid foundation had been laid for a prosperous home, he was at this time left alone with his childnen. On October 1, 1881 he was married again to Miss Hilda Goodburn of Postville, Iowa - who survives him with their four childnen, one daughter and three sons. One daughter dying in infancy.

Of his first children, three crossed death's river before their father, Mrs Amanda M Tralle of Yankton, John E of Castalia, and Adelbert of Vermillion. Of his children, all are grown up except the two younger lads. As an old pioneer he was among the few left in this county. Those who were best acquainted with him know of the sterling qualities of his character. After but a few day's illness he was called by the



Great Physician to Himself. On Friday monning August 18, he passed across the river Leaving 11 children, 21 grandchildren, and 2 great grandchildren, with the wife and mother to mourn the Loss of a dear husband and father. Of his family now Living the children were all present at the funeral, with the exception of the families of Mrs Ella M Hartwell of Aberdeen, South Dakota and Mrs. Ollie Dye of Pullman, Nebraska.

On Sunday a large concourse of friends and neighbors gathered at his late home to pay that last tribute of respect to one whom they knew and loved so well.

Services were conducted by Rev. Messrs Craig S Thoms and J S Stewart, and the remains were laid to rest in the Bluff Cemetery.

To the surviving widow and the children the sympathy of the community is extend in their beneavement.
