ALTERED/MOVED NOTES: Original site. Some of horse stalls have been removed. 1-1x4"x 26" corrugated, galvanized steel roofing applied over cedar shingles on the roof.

INTERIOR NOTES: Two rows of 6x6 posts, and 6x6 beam support the 2x6 joists for the hayloft floor. Part of two double horse stalls still in the SE corner. Seven wooden milk cow stanchions still on the West wall. 8' x 10' granary are still on the center of the South wall.

OTHER NOTES: 2x6 stud walls with 1x10 shiplap and embossed brick, galvanized steel siding. Rafters are 2x6's. A 2x6 brace from the top of the wall in the hayloft down to the floor. From the East wall 8' - 10'- 10' - 10' - 10' O. C. Windows are 4" x 24" four light. 6x6 sill under walls.

*PHYSICAL NOTES: Barn is in poor condition.

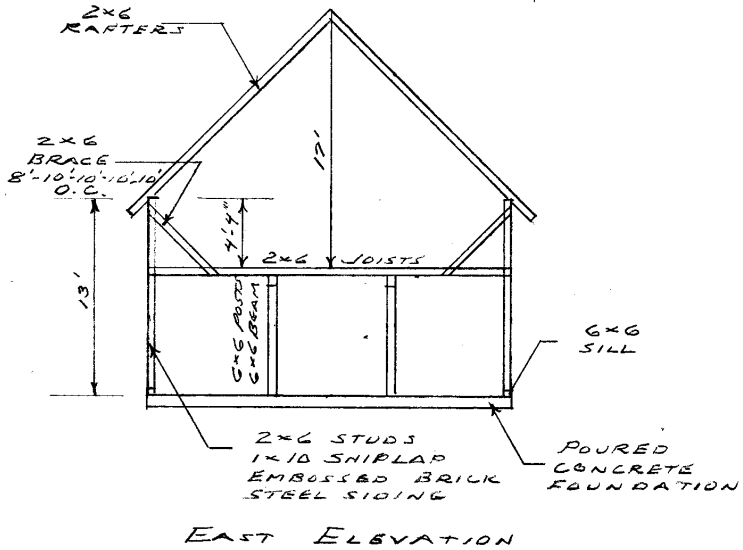
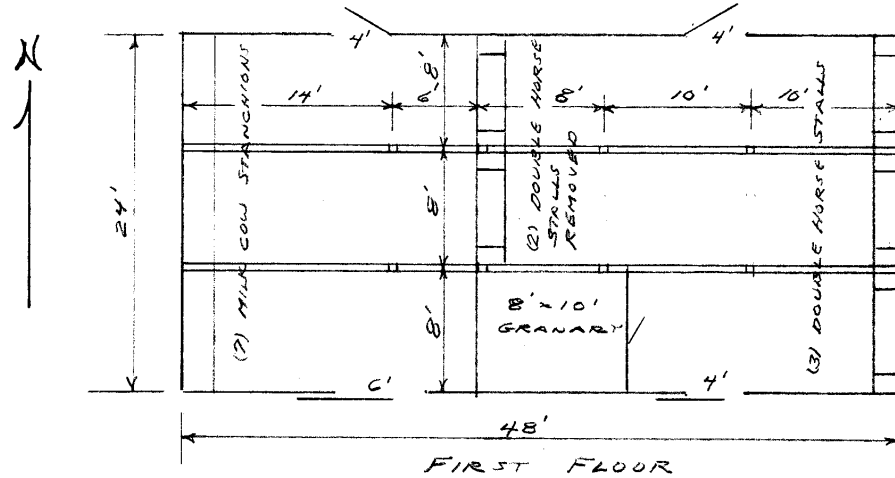

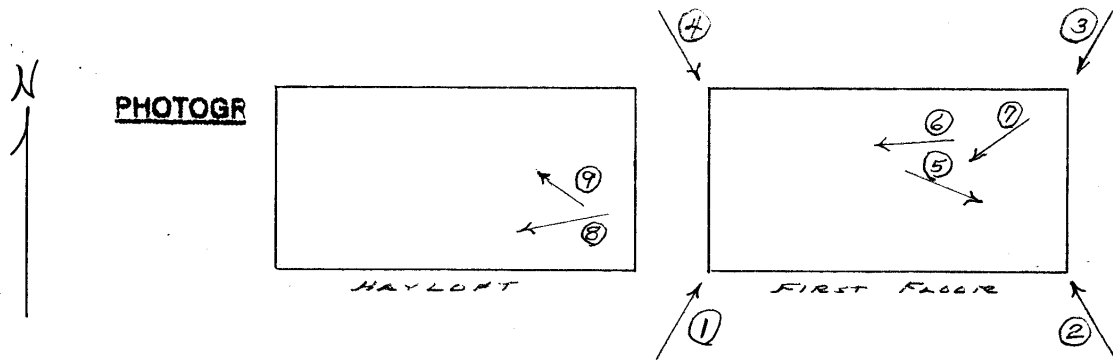

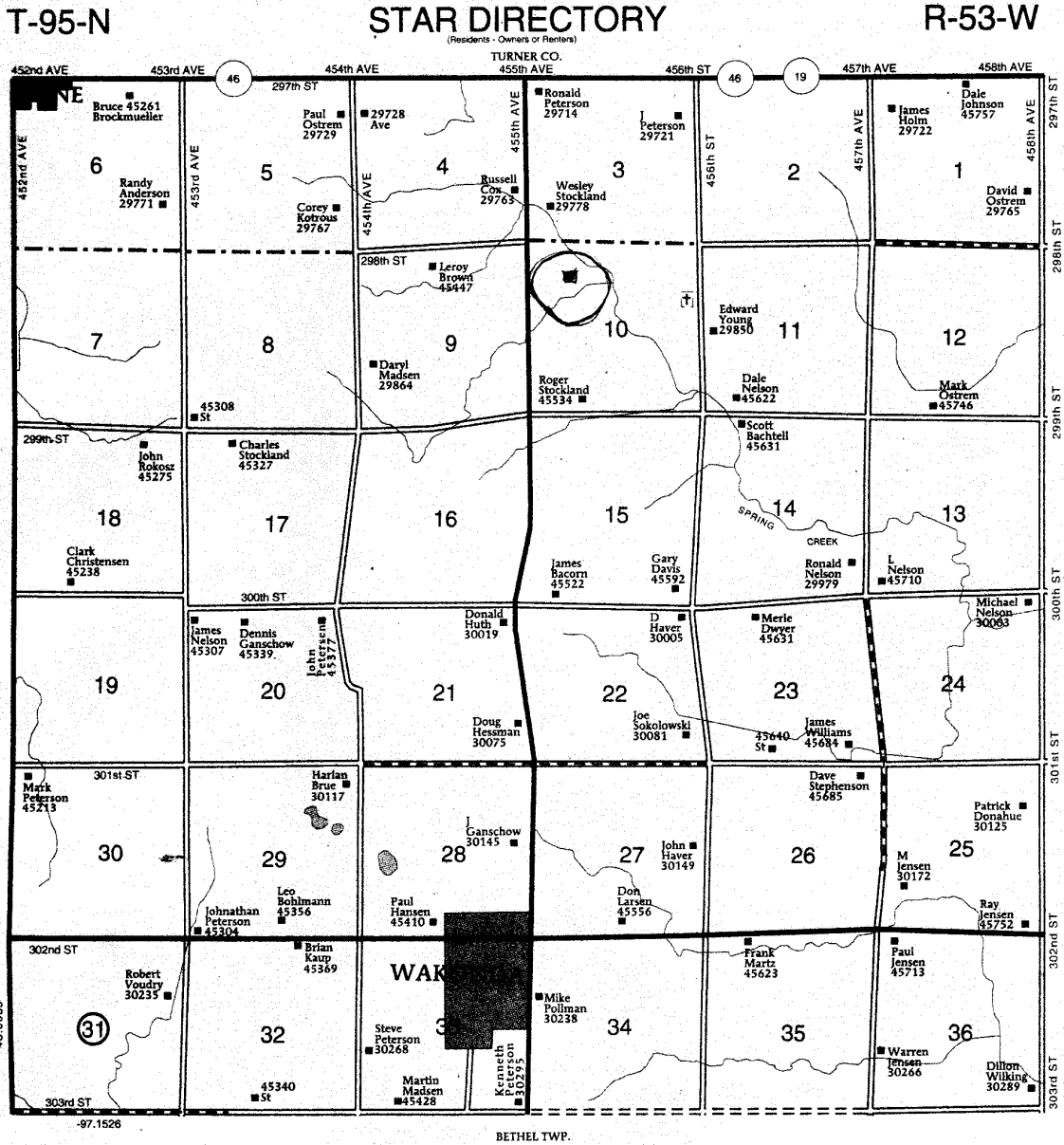

HISTORY

This farm located in the NW ¼ of Section 10, Star Township, Clay County was homesteaded by Robert Young.

The 1894, 1901 and 1912 Clay County Atlas lists Robert Young as the owner.

The 1924 Clay County Atlas lists the owner as Robert Young Estate.

The 1937 Clay County Atlas lists N. A. Madsen, D. W. Zoayer and J. J. Young as the owners.

The 1948 and 1956 Clay County Atlas lists Mathida Madsen as the owner.

The John and Mary Young and family immigrated from Ireland to Canada to Iowa and then to this area. They would try to be on the school board so they could hire Catholic teachers and the protestant members would try to hire protestant teachers.

Micheal Young homesteaded NE ¼ Section 3, Allen Young homesteaded NW 1/4 Section 2, Wm Young homesteaded NW ¼ and NE ¼ Section 9, Robert Young homesteaded NW 1/4 Section 10 and John Young homesteaded NE ¼ Section 10.

John and Mary Young Family

John and Mary (Shannon) Young landed in Canada and came to Garryown, Iowa and then to South Dakota (Dakota territory). Records show that their son, Robert, was born in Sussex, Vale, Canada on May 18, 1849.

Mary Shannon often told how their ship was lost at sea for six months and they thought they would never see land again. They had to ration food and water. Because Mary was nursing a baby, a black gentleman shared his water with her.

John and Mary (Shannon) Young raised five boys, three girls and three orphan children. The orphan children came with many other children from Boston on a train, which came to the orphanage Dec. 3, 1883 and departed Dec. 16, 1883. There are no solid facts, but some say the train came to Vermillion and others Wakonda. Many of these children were adopted by several families in this area (e.g. John and Ed Dever, Mike McCarty, George O'Sheen and "Rusty".)

John and Mary Young came to Clay County in 1870 with all of their children except Lizza Jane Allen and Allen Young. Allen stayed with his widowed sister for one year to help care for her five children. At the age of ten Allen joined his parents on their homestead, which is now known as the Jim Young farm next to the north cemetery. Allen wanted to homestead the land that Allen T. Young now lives on, but he was not 21 years old so his oldest brother, Robert, stayed until Allen was 21. The official homestead was filed at the Land Office of Yankton, Dakota Territory and signed (the land patent) by the president (Benjamin Harrison) June 8, 1889.

The children of John and Mary (Shannon) Young were:

1. Robert (1849-1819 never married. He farmed what is now the Roger Stockland farm.
2. Mike (1856-July 1919) married Elizabeth Buckley. They had ten children. Mike farmed across the road from Allen Young.
3. Bill (1846 – August 1919) married Maggie Ruth. They had one child, Mary Hood, by his wife's prior marriage. He farmed where LeRoy Brown now farms.
4. Allen (Sept. 4, 1860 – Feb. 9, 1941) married Bridget Griffon. Their children John, Robert, Marry, James, Frank, Bill, Allen T., Kate, Alice, Joe, Dan, Leo and Lucy. They farmed what is now the Allen T. Young farm.
5. Jim (March 1863 – Jan 29, 1943) never married. He lived on the family homestead.

6. Ellen (1862 – 1919) married Ed Ryan. Their children were William, John, Michael, Ella, Agnes (Mrs. Joe fisher), Katie (Mrs. George Marrion), Maggie (Mrs. Frank Griffon) and Anastasia. They lost three children in infancy. They farmed what is now the Bill Young
7. Lizza Jane Allen stayed in Zwingler, Iowa. Her children were John, Jim, Tom, Margaret Shannon, and girl, Ahern.
8. Catherine (18 - 1896) married Bill Dwyer. Their children were John, Bridget, Mary (Mrs. George Dixon), William, James, Ellen (Mrs. John Weingartner), Thomas, Mike, Katie (Mrs. Obert Olson), and Elizabeth “Babe” (Mrs. Clare Fairfield). They farmed four miles east and two miles south of Wakonda.
9. John Dever (October 1876 – April 1956) orphan son Married Elizabeth Jeniter. They had one son, Ed Dever.
10. Ed Dever orphan son is buried in Parker, S.D.
11. Orphan girl – no known facts.
Robert, Mike. Allen, Jim and Ellen are all buried in the North Catholic Cemetery. Catherine is buried in the South Catholic cemetery. Lizza is buried in Iowa, John in Centerville and Ed in Parker.
