

Three double horse stalls were on the West wall of the center barn. The lean-tos have no evidence of what								
they were used for. The East lean-to and the center original barn are used for calving now.								
OTHER NOTES: 2x4 stud walls, 1x6 #106 drop siding and 1-1/4" x 26" corrugated, galvanized steel								
applied vertically. Rafters are 2x6's in the original barn and in the West lean-to. They are 2x8's, 9' O. C.								
in the East lean-to, 2x4 purlins and sheathing up and down on the roof and with steel roofing. Windows								
were 8" x 10" four light, but all are gone or covered with steel roofing								
*PHYSICAL NOTES: Barn is in fair condition, except the West lean-to, which the roof has caved in.



HISTORY

This farm located in the NE ¼ of Section 9, Star Township, Clay County was homesteaded by William Young.

The 1894 Clay County Atlas lists M. Young as the owner.

The 1901, 1912, 1924, 1937 and 1948 lists Thomas J. Hood as the owner. The 1937 Clay County Atlas lists R. Hood as the operator.

The 1956 Clay County Atlas lists Margaret Hood as the owner.

Thomas J. and Mary Hood Family

Thomas J. Hood, son of Eliza and John Hood, was born on April 20, 1867, in Dungannon, Tyrone County, Ireland. After his parents died, an uncle sent him and his sister Sarah to relatives in the United States. Thomas was 14 and his sister was 16. They came to Emmetsburg, Iowa first, then both of them walked overland to (what is now Wakonda) Dakota Territory. The first person they saw was a little girl coming up out of a dug home of her parents Mary and Samuel Montgomery. They (the Montgomery's) also had another daughter Martha. Thomas worked for Robert and Johnnie Montgomery herding cattle on the prairie. He also worked several years for M. D. Moore. He was caught in the big blizzard, but managed to crawl back to the dugout home of John Haddorf. His face and hands were frozen.

Thomas J. Hood was united in marriage to Miss Mary Sarah Roets on Jan 22, 1891, at Wakonda. Mrs. Hood, daughter of John and Margaret Roets was born in Waukesha County, Wisc., Oct. 9, 1869. She came to Dakota Territory with her parents when she was three years old. They took a claim east of Viborg. Her father died the first year they were here. Later her mother married William Young and they moved to the homestead purchased by the Thomas Hood's several years later. Mrs. Thomas Hood lived on the same farm for over 75 years.

Thomas and Mary Hood had nine children: Margaret, James, Mary, John, Stella, Thomas Jr., Robert, Samuel and Jessie. Of this group, only three are living today, Margaret, John and Thomas.
